The foray with FORCE and interested public members identified the following fungi:

**Crane Park Island** – area immediately over bridge and path by river

<b>Name</b> (as per GB checklist)	<b>Common name</b> if any	<b>Association</b>
<i>Auricularia mesenterica</i>	Tripe Fungus	inside old hollow willow
<i>Laccaria laccata</i>	Deceiver	in grass near oak
<i>Inocybe</i> sp.	-	in grass near oak
<i>Trametes gibbosa</i>	Lumpy bracket	on trunks of living crack willow
<i>Leratiomyces ceres</i>	Redlead Roundhead	on woodchip
<i>Pluteus cervinus</i>	Shield	on woodchip
<i>Mycena</i> sp.	-	in grass
<i>Ganoderma australe</i>	Ganoderma	on willow
<i>Ramaria stricta</i>	-	on woody debris under English elm hedge

**Crane Park** – northern end.

Mixed deciduous woodland with ivy, bramble, nettle ground cover.

<i>Agrocybe cylindracea</i>	Poplar Fieldcap	at base of sycamore
<i>Agaricus impudicus</i>	-	in open area under nettle etc. near old dead tree.
<i>Pluteus cervinus</i>	Deer Shield	log pile
<i>Coprinellus micaceus</i>	Glistening Inkcap	log pile
<i>Exidia nucleata</i>	Crystal Brain	on rotting wood
<i>Psathyrella</i> sp.	-	on rotting wood
<i>Agaricus xanthodermus</i>	Yellow Stainer	by path
<i>Lepiota griseovirens</i>	-	by path
<i>Conocybe vestita/velata</i>	-	by path
<i>Mycena galopus</i>	Milking Bonnet	by path
<i>Mycena</i> sp.	-	by path
<i>Armillaria mellea</i>	Honey Fungus	on wood
<i>Lepista sordida</i>	Blewitt	by path in woodland
<i>Pleurotus ostreatus</i>	Oyster Mushroom	on old very rotten large log
<i>Pluteus phlebephorus</i>	Wrinkled Shield	on rotting wood
<i>Trametes gibbosa</i>	Lumpy Bracket	on old wood
<i>Laccaria</i> cf. <i>purpureobadia</i> *	-	under hornbeam near river edge
<i>Phellinus igniarius</i>	-	on old washed-up wood by river edge
<i>Daldinia concentrica</i>	King Alfred's Cakes	old log
<i>Stereum rugosum</i>	Bleeding Broadleaf Crust	old log

\* AO found the spores are not quite as described for *L. purpureobadia*, and so although possible, this ID is not conclusive and is being researched further.
